FINANCIAL AID

Supplemental Security Income (SSI) is a federal program that provides financial assistance to people who have little or no income and resources. If the Social Security Administration approves a Plan for Achieving Self Support, the student would be able to set aside income and resources that are being used toward a specific vocational goal (tuition, equipment or other needs) and continue to receive SSI payments. Most families will need to fill out the **FAFSA** (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). Obtain this from the student's High School Guidance Office or from the Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency, (Voice: 800-233-0557, www.pheaa.org).

Be sure to contact the financial aid office at the school the student is interested in attending, and complete all required forms on time. Other sources of information include the local public library, the Internet, and the following materials:
